### Back Home From Germany

with out it setting. So to say the least we were really beat that evening when we met with the prison ministry to go over what the itinerary was going to be. There was a very active schedule planned for us and we were all looking forward to it.

The Gefährdetenhilfe has a couple different men's homes that are there to help them get their lives together. One has a program that has a woodworking shop and then the other has a dairy. One of the first things we did was to go to one of those homes and conduct an evening Bible study.

We left to go to Germany at the invitation of Pastor Edmund Coroneel and a prison ministry called Gefährdetenhilfe which means in German "Helping the Endangered". The Lord had opened the door and we were responding to the call, excited to see what He was going to do.

We were not an hour into our ten hour flight when a man had a heart attack and we were sure we were going to have to land in Salt Lake. But as it turned out there were a number of medical personnel who just happened to be on this flight and they were able to take care of everything. It was then that I got an inner peace that made me realize that no matter what attacks may come, I knew God was in this with us.

It really is an unnatural thing; to leave in the morning, fly for ten hours then find yourself in the next morning, almost 24 hours later. We followed the sun all the way over

more than generous with us.

The German idea of justice is far different than ours in this country to say the least. I was prepared for it being more liberal than it is here but I had no idea just how very much different it actually turned out to be.

The average time spent in prison in Germany is three years with the most anyone ever serves is fifteen years. There are some very rare exceptions where after a person has done his time the state can determine they are too dangerous to return to society.

One of the real highlights for me personally was where they had arranged for us to have a meeting with the Minister of Justice for the state of Hessesches. Along with the Minister of Justice was their Director of Prisons and someone from their legal department.

I was very surprised at the courtesy given, not just in seeing us but in how frank and open they spoke and the amount of time they gave us. They were

They have laws in Germany that if two prisoners have to be in the same cell they must be able to have privacy when using the rest room. Due to over crowding they recently had to remodel a number of cells to comply with the law. I could not even imagine anything like that being the case over here. If they don't have enough room in my jail the inmates can and often do find themselves sleeping on a pew in the Chapel. Here in the states, privacy has never been a concern in any jail I have ever been.

There is one policy they have that really amazed me. I am sure most of you have heard how in Europe they really like their vacations. Over there it is not uncommon at all to get five weeks vacation a year. Well what you don't know is the prisoners get vacation too! They each get twenty-one days a year. If they are too dangerous to be let out for their "holiday", they are exempted from work in the prison for those days.

Another thing that was amazing to me was what their cells looked like. We got to take a tour of Dietz prison and what I saw I did not believe! In our tour we were shown a cell and this was in their max security area where the men had been determined to be too dangerous to be released at the end of their sentence. The cell I went into was equipped with a small refrigerator, TV, VCR, Dish TV with fifty channels and a video game machine of some kind. It may have even had something to cook on as well, I didn't notice. I don't have a picture of the cells in Dietz prison but I did get one off the website for the largest prison in Germany, Berlin-Tegel State Prison . ↓



I am getting ahead of myself. I want to share some more of what happened while we met with the Minister of Justice. But I first needed to explain what the prisons were like so that you could understand the impact of what we talked about.

He was very proud of their programs and also spoke very candidly on some of his frustrations. He was more than a little amazed when he heard that our jail had seven thousand people in it, where the largest in Germany has

1,600 men and most were about 500. We talked on a number of subjects concerning the prisons both from their perspective and from what it is like over here. At one point I asked him what their recidivism rate was. He said it was at sixty-five percent. I explained to him that our return rate of inmates who come back within the first three years is at eighty percent.

I made an observation to him that with all their programs, short sentences and good treatment neither of our systems are doing the job. I can almost understand why some would come back in Germany as well as they are treated but they have good programs waiting for them when they get out too. It's a socialist system that provides for everyone so they don't need to go back to prison to get treated well. In our system when a person gets out they are given \$200.00 gate money and many times a cynical guard will say "be seeing you soon" because once that gate money is gone its all about the homeless shelter unless they have family or friends to go to.

The Minister of Justice asked me why I thought it was that neither system was doing a better job of keeping them out of prison. I told him that it was because we have left God out of the "program"! That unless you change a man's heart you will never change the man and the only way to change a man's heart is by God doing it.

He was quiet a long moment and when he did speak he said "I think you are right." For me it was one of the real high-lights of the trip. Not that it is going to make some big difference but for a man in his position to admit even privately something like that meant a lot to me.

About half way through our meeting the Minister of Justice had to leave for another meeting but before he left us, he went over to one of the leaders of

Gefährdetenhilfe, spoke to him in German, handed him a piece a of paper then left.

It wasn't until we were headed back to our car that I found out what it was that he had given them. He had given them his personal information to contact him if they ever needed anything. They seemed very pleased that had happened and I hope it may assist them with their ministry somehow.

On our tour of Dietz prison the first thing you notice is that the church is the most predominate feature of the whole place. Actually if you were to look down on it from above it would be like a large + (plus) sign with the church at the front. I don't know for sure but I would like to think that it may have had its design origins being similar to the original prisons in our country. You see the very first prison in this country was established by the Quakers with the premise that it is from repentance that man can achieve restoration.

Dietz is over one hundred and twenty-five years old and it was amazing to me how well taken care of it was. It was very well maintained; compared to Men's Central Jail that is approximately forty years old. In defense of Men's Central, we have seven thousand men to their population of five hundred men.

They have a gym with a basketball court with a hardwood floor that any college would be happy to have. And workout equipment as nice as any

fitness center we have over here.

They showed us the industry area where the inmates were at work. It gave us the opportunity to talk to a number of the men and to invite them to the church service we were coming back to do that following Sunday morning. During the tour a number of Americans came up and talked to us. A few I had talked to were once in the military, then married a German and later ended up in prison for one thing or another.

We were able to meet the Catholic Chaplain. He invited us to his office to have coffee with him. It was interesting to talk with him and realize we had many things in common in spite of our differences. I felt he definitely cared about his men and what he did there. So in that way I definitely felt a common bond with him.

One day the four team members went to four different prisons with our counterparts from the Gefährdetenhilfe. Jeff Torok went to a prison called Friedberg Prison. And I went to another of the Max security prisons

called Butzbach prison. I don't remember the names of the two prisons that Matt Monzon and Tony Maese went to. But we all went to different prisons.

The person taking me to Butzbach was one of the leaders in the local chapter of Gefährdetenhilfe. His name is Hartmut Nickel. He is a Captain of the police department of Herborn/Seelbach. He took me to his house to have coffee and to meet his wife and son. There have been so many times I have had this kind of experience and yet I never stop being amazed by it. The way God has worked in my life to bring me into things that never would have happened before the Lord came into my life. In my life before Him there is no way I would be sitting in the Captain of police's home having coffee or in the office of a Minister of Justice either!

In Butzbach we were taken into a cell block and let into what looked like one of the cells on the tier but as it turned out it actually was two cells with the wall removed to convert the two cells into one larger meeting room. We had a small group meeting where I mainly gave my testimony and then had some question and answer time at the end. One thing I thought ironic is they were mostly Russian, with one Turk also in the group. Here I wanted to go to the prisons of Russia and instead I met with

Russians in Germany.

What happened with Jeff that night is what I think is a good example of the reasons we were supposed to be in Germany. [By example, to raise the standard of ministry.] When Jeff was asked what he intended to do that night he said he would do the same kind of thing that we did in the prison services over here in the states. He asked the guy going in with him if he would open in prayer, worship in German and then translate for him while he taught from the Word. The guy told Jeff that he probably shouldn't do that because he would not keep the mens attention. So he suggested to just read a verse to them pray if he wanted and then they would just visit with them. Jeff said he hadn't come half way around the world to just visit with them and said he wanted to give the gospel.

On their way home after the service the man told Jeff he was convicted by how the inmates listened to every word of what Jeff had been teaching.....

***So shall My word be that goes forth from My mouth; It shall not return to Me void, But it shall accomplish what I please, And it shall prosper in the thing for which I sent it.***

**Isaiah 55:11**

Our largest service inside the different prisons was held on our last day there. We went into Dietz prison and did their Sunday service.

We had hoped to have a good turn out because of the tour earlier in the week where we had the chance to invite them to come.

Gefährdetenhilfe has a choir that came in with us and they were really a blessing; kind of a German style Scarlet Hope. They sang both in German and English. Worship makes such a difference, especially when it is good worship.

I wish I had a picture of the inside of the church at Dietz prison, it really is something to see. Stained glass windows and a huge pipe organ up in a loft. The wood work was beautiful, with one of those old time podiums that you have to climb up some stairs to get into it.

Once again there was an ironic twist in that, we had these three somewhat unruly inmates in the service. Talking loudly during prayer and at other times through out the service. At one point Matt turned around to them and asked them to show some respect by quieting down, Their response to Matt was anything but respectful. The ironic part is the trouble makers were Russian inmates. If anything it makes me want to someday go to Russian prisons all the more.

We think of ourselves as the "melting pot of the world." And its true that ethnically we are a very diverse

group of people in this country. The world has often rightly criticized us for our racial bigotry and I used to wonder why that is. Going to Europe and seeing the changes they are starting to go through I think I am starting to at least somewhat understand.

With the new United States of Europe and its open borders they are now having large groups of people migrating all over Europe. An example of that was while in Germany we wanted to go out to try some of their German food. You know the only real German food we ate was in someone's home! I saw Turkish, Greek, Italian and Chinese restaurants all over the place.

We don't have a monopoly on racial bigotry here in this country. In prisons over there I could definitely see the signs of it. The Turks are not at all liked by many Germans and of course the feelings run very deep between the Russians and Germans.

One thing for sure that you are struck with over there is they have a very long history of wars between them. Prejudice is a universal human condition, a condition of sin within us all. You can certainly see that the enemy is alive and well.

As I was up sharing with the men at Dietz, the three men in the back who had been acting up became even more disruptive. I didn't know till later that they were Russians but it just so happened that I was sharing about an experience I had ten years ago when I had spoken to a captain of a Russian submarine that was a atheist. When I got to the part where I was quoting from ***Psalms 53:1*** "The fool has said in his heart, There is no God." I looked right at them and said "some in here today are fools", and that got their attention. I guess sometimes the truth can be offensive but its still the truth.

Why did God send us half way around the world to go into those prisons? We may never know the answer to that question. Maybe it was to teach each of us something? We had chosen Romans 1:16&17 as our banner verses for this trip. Partly because they are supposed to be Martin Luther's favorite verses. But also because we are not ashamed of the gospel and we did want to proclaim it while we are there.

We are all very aware that we are saved by grace. And as when Jesus was anointed with oil by the woman with the alabaster vase He said that those who are forgiven much, love much.

There was a time in my life when I thought it was impossible for me to love anything or anyone. But in my life today, I do know how much grace was given to me and I do love Him very much!

I am more than grateful for the opportunity of being able to go, for Pastor Edmund and Gefährdetenhilfe inviting us to come, for Calvary Downey and Pastor Jeff for sending me, the guys who went with me answering the call, but most importantly for Jesus who made it all possible.

I hope if we accomplished nothing else while going into the different prisons, that by example we demonstrated systematically teaching through the word, the prisoners **will** come and by His Word the captives will be set free.

In April one of the Gefährdetenhilfe members will be coming over here for vacation. His idea of vacation is going to as many Calvary Chapels as he can. It's already been arranged for him to go in with our ministry to the Chino prison and to both the Twin Towers and Men's Central Jail. If you meet Thomas be sure to give Him a Calvary Chapel welcome.

I don't know what any of us expected to see when we got to Calvary Chapel Herborn but I would have never thought it would be all that it is. What God is doing there is nothing short of a miracle, many of them at that!

Neither Matt or Tony had ever known Pastor Edmund so they really didn't know what to expect. Both Jeff and I had our teenagers grow up under Edmund's ministry while he was at CCCH.

We went straight to the church from the airport and I was totally blown away with what God is doing there.

I have been so excited about it I haven't stopped talking about since I have been home. In fact I have already talked with Pastors from four different Calvary's and a public access Christian TV show trying to promote some churches going over there to do outreaches.

Where we flew in on a Saturday morning and met with the prison ministry Gefährdetenhilfe the first night was all we could handle for the first day. The second day was something else, being able to go to both the morning and evening service at Calvary Herborn it gave us a good idea what the fellowship was like. And they really went all out to help make us feel at home.

Edmund was not intending to start a

church it just seemed to happen on its own. At the time it all started he was just coming down from Calvary Siegen where he was the youth pastor. He was having a Bible study with a number of the youth from the area that were commuting from the Herborn area all the way over to Siegen.

It soon grew to forty people and they kept outgrowing their meeting places. Then an opportunity came along for them to use a building at an old military base that some land developers had obtained. One thing has lead to another and they are no longer just borrowing the building, they are buying it! They have gone from a group of about forty to a group of about two hundred in a years time!

Calvary Siegen has been there for ten years and have out grown their meeting places three times. We went to see the building they are in the midst of building right now and it is awesome!

Pastor Edmund had said that he had watched Calvary Siegen outgrow its building three times. Years ago he had heard the story of how a church had bought a huge Whitefront store in Downey and everyone thought at the time, "what would they do with such a big building?"

I never knew Edmund's testimony before but one night at dinner his wife Martha told me the story. How he was dealing drugs and she had made her mind up that she was going to divorce him. Then one night she went to hear Pastor Jeff Johnson give his testimony and she thought if God can do it for Pastor Jeff maybe He would do it for Edmund too. Edmund came to hear Pastor Jeff speak on end times, just the thing Edmund was interested in and God used that to bring him to his knees.

They didn't get raised up at Calvary Downey, soon after accepting the Lord the bought a house out in Chino Hills and was part of the original Bible study group that became CCCH.

The first youth group was at Edmunds house. I can remember back to when he was driving a truck for a living and was struggling to decide to quit his job and go into ministry full time.

Years later they were "launched out" from the launching pad of CCCH and went to Germany and now look what the Lord is doing!

It really gave me personally a lot of encouragement to see what the Lord is doing in the Coronel's lives. Having been "launched" into own ministry I know only too well the trials and testing that comes with the territory.

The building they have just acquired

for Calvary Herborn is amazing in many ways. Edmund decided to learn from Pastor Jeff at Downey and from what has happened at Calvary Siegen. The size of this building they will not out grow it any-time soon. The building is 66,000 sq feet in size!

It used to be the mess hall for the military base. The main dinning room will eventually become the sanctuary once they are able to heat the room. For now they are just using a small corner of it for a coffee bar.



They have a much smaller area that they are use for the sanctuary right now and everyone fits in there fine. Later it will probably be used for the youth.



The building sat empty for nearly fifteen years and I understand it was a real mess when they first got in there. It is amazing what has been accomplished already.

Many of the children's class rooms are already well on their way to being completed. All the way down to kids murals on walls.

They have already done some

extensive work in remodeling a area for outreach teams to stay when they come over. They have a full kitchen, two bath room with showers, a sitting room and three bedrooms that will sleep two per room.

They have it fixed up nice and we were very comfortable while we were there. They have plans to remodel a much larger area that will accommodate many more so it will be a lot less expensive to come over to do outreaches. The savings on lodging will be considerable.

They will have a lot of room to do any number of things with that facility. And there is even the possibility that yet another building that used to be the base motor pool may get donated to them for the write off. If that happens they are already dreaming on having a youth center for the community that would really be something.

Edmund Jr. is the youth pastor and he had his first week end retreat while we were there. And from all the praise reports from the teens when they got back it was a great success.

He had to leave for the retreat with his wife expecting their second child at any moment. As it turned out little Caleb didn't come until a few weeks later.

I had a parent telling me how their child has been transformed since coming to Calvary. Their teenager had been very wild, into drinking, drugs and more and now the whole family is on fire for the Lord and coming to every service they have at Herborn.

The youth over there are allowed to buy beer and wine at the age of sixteen. You can just imagine how a youth pastor over there has his work cut out for him,

Another thing that I think is really great about their location is the

church sits up on a hill overlooking the valley where both villages are. So at night when the church is lit up you can see it from down in the town. It made me think of that scriptures:

***"You are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hidden.***

***Matthew 5:14***

and

***Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven.***

***Matthew 5:16***

As I said at the beginning of this newsletter, we had no idea what God had called us over there to do. After getting there it became more clear as time went on. For one thing we all agreed it was to come up along side of the prison ministry and even possibly to cause division in that ministry, dividing tradition from the ones seeking anew wine in new wine skins.

But there was another reason too, it was to do in-reach into a new church, too encourage them and come along side them. To come back to the states and encourage others to go and see for themselves what the Lord is doing and how they can also be used by Him.

For me personally, it was so good just to spend time with the Coronel family. It went a long way towards encouraging me.

Please whatever you do, keep the Coronel's and Calvary Chapel Herborn in your prayers. If you knew the Coronel's from CCCH, drop then a line and let them know you are thinking about them. I am sure that would mean a lot to them.



What I am going to write about now is something I haven't wanted to write about at all. I've had others tell me I should have said something long before now but its difficult for me to do.

What finally convinced me that I needed to say something was after talking to someone the other day that I hadn't seen or spoken to in awhile. I told him about some of the needs this ministry has and he said two things I hadn't even stopped to think of.

He said he had been getting and reading the newsletters and assumed everything was going well with the ministry. And also that the ministry being "out of sight, was out of mind" so he had put his focus in other directions. After talking to him it made me realize that I really did need to say something or how else would anyone know.

It is true that the ministry is going well. There are always going to be more and more opportunities to minister. *The need is great and the labors are few.*

Before going into full time ministry I worked in aero-space for a number of years. When aero-space took a big downturn I went to work for Walt Disney Imagineering building rides for theme parks. Both careers had always provided very well for my family yet we have always known who it was that was supplying all our needs.

So going into full time ministry in a missionary status was not as hard a decision as some may think it would have been. My wife was behind me, (I had to have that or I never could have gone forward) and we both believed and still do believe that God will take care of us just as He always has.

None the less this past year or so has gotten tougher and tougher. Maybe some of it is because of "out of sight out of mind"? And maybe some of it is people assume from the tone of our news letters everything is going well? It is going well, when it comes

to open doors of ministry, there is not enough time in the day!

I hear from many of you that say you enjoy the newsletters and let me know you are praying for us. And there are many of you that are obviously supporting us or we wouldn't have been able to all we have. We have had a very faithful donor base, all your help, prayers and support, I deeply appreciate each and everyone of you for your faithfulness. Please understand I am not really addressing this to you now.

What I am hoping to do is encourage the ones who receive this newsletter and are not contributing to this ministry to consider doing so now. We really are in need and as I keep being reminded; we don't have because we don't ask.

I have tried many different things to keep things going. Consolidating our bills and refinancing our home twice this past year. I was at one point trying to get a part time job working at a family counseling center hoping to add to our income. I thought I would still be doing ministry and at the same time bringing in some more income. I was getting impatient waiting for the job to start and now in hind-sight I realize it was God's covering that kept it from happening. The reason it never happened is guy who was going to hire me to do the counseling was arrested. Maybe it was he who needed counseling?

Another thing we've been trying is to get with different Calvary's and other churches to see if they would consider putting this ministry on their missionary list for support. This is a domestic mission, going to a "different world" with the gospel. So far there have been three Calvary's who have started to contribute and a couple more who are considering it. For now that will account for about 1% of our monthly budget if all five churches start to contribute to this ministry. Unlike what many just assume, this ministry does not get its funding from a church, its overall funding is from individual contributors.

I know that the motto of Calvary is where God guides God provides. I really do believe in that and it's been proven to me over and over again. I am trusting in Him, I know He did call me to this and I don't think He called me into this for it to end now. But I also know I have to be able to provide for my family. The Bible tells me I am worse than a non-believer if I don't provide for them.

I just went through that kind of struggle while getting ready to go to Germany. Calvary Downey had picked up my expenses for the trip. And I was all set to go. Only problem was I would be leaving with bills unpaid and not enough there for my family. I didn't know what to do and all I could do was turn to the Lord and say this is His to work out. And you know He did, He worked it out in the most unusual way; my son totaled my wife's van two weeks before we were to leave for Germany.

To make a long story short we got an insurance settlement for top dollar on our high mileage van, a replacement for our van with half the mileage and we still had enough left over to make up for what we had been short on support. God is so Good!

We have had many experiences like that over the past three and a half years. God has been so faithful! When 9/11 happened, when the war started, the fires in our mountains; it has all had its effects on donations and yet somehow God always pulls us through.

I am convinced that He will continue to supply our needs. This ministry has a group of Godly people on its Board of Directors who I believe the Lord has assembled to help make the decisions on where we go from here and ultimately it is the Lord who is directing our course. Please keep us in your prayers. And I hope you will pray about coming along side this ministry in whatever way the Lord may lead.

There was some adjustments to be made after getting back from Germany and not just from jet-lag. But it was time to get back to what I am supposed to be doing at Men's Central Jail.

It was really cool to see how many of the men asked me about Germany when I got back. I have been able to share with groups of them about it and use the applications within our Bible studies.

One of the things that was kind of ironic was that I had prepared a study in Romans that I had planed to do while in Germany. I never got to it while I was there so one day I decided to teach on it at the jail. The response was a large number of men either made first time commitments to Christ or rededications. Things may not work out like we plan but God's timing is always right.

After getting back I was looking for Sam who he was not around and I became concerned that he had already been sentenced. That didn't turn out to be the case, in fact his sentencing had to be postponed because there had been a death in the Judges family.

When Sam was telling me about it he said he was concerned for the Judge and how terrible he must be feeling. Sam had actually been praying for the man who will ultimately decide how much time he

spends in jail and he was not selfishly praying about what he would be sentenced (for his own concerns) but for the Judge. It is amazing to watch how God can change a man's heart.

It is just as amazing to me to see how the enemy can rob and destroy! I just met a man who was a Calvary pastor for a number of years who now sits in jail rejecting the God he once believed in and taught others about. He now has concocted his own version of who he thinks God is. He says he still believes in God, just not the God of the Bible. How can that be? It should be a warning to us all.

**Now all these things happened to them as examples, and they were written for our admonition, upon whom the ends of the ages have come. Therefore let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall. 1 Corinthians 10:11-12**

I recently met another man that touched my heart. He worked as a trustee in a area near my office and he said he had been watching me from a distance sort of sizing me up to see what I was like. And he said he decided he had to talk to someone about what he had kept bottled up in him for some time.

He is an ex-con who got out of prison recently on parole and just as soon as he was out his parole was violated. Only thing was he had done it intentionally. He wanted to be back in jail. You see just days before he was to get out of prison his wife and infant

son were kill by a drunk driver. And to make matters even worse he vaguely knew the drunk driver.

All he had was revenge in his heart and thought by going into the jail he would be able to get it. Only thing is God had other plans, the driver is not even in the same county jail system. So for a while the man was having to deal with the torment of his loss and fight with the demons hatred at the same time.

He couldn't keep it in any more and wanted to talk with someone about it. We spent a couple hours talking and for a large portion of the time I just listened. He had some religion in his back ground and as he spoke that became more and more clear. Only trouble was he knew about religion without the understanding he could have a relationship with a living God who would be there with him. It really didn't take much on my part to convince him he needed change in his life. All I had to do was explain to him their really is a God who he can have a personal relationship with and the Spirit took care of the rest. He was ready before he had come into my office.

I gave him a Bible and some other materials to read and we prayed before he left that day. Now every time I see him, he got a smile on his face and he makes sure to tell me he is in the Word. Dave just has a few months till he gets out, please keep him in your prayers.

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
